HYUNDAI'S HELLO

Welcome to Rally Sweden for round two of the 2019 FIA World Rally Championship, which got off to a fantastic start for the Hyundai Motorsport team with a great performance from everyone on Rallye Monte-Carlo.

I hope you all enjoyed the exciting battle as much as we did with the closest finish in Monte-Carlo history as Thierry and Nicolas claimed the runner-up spot behind Sébastien Ogier, with just 2.2 seconds separating them. It was incredibly tight all weekend and a fantastic way to begin the new WRC season.

If someone had told us before Monte that we would finish in second place, with Sébastien Loeb and Daniel just missing out on a podium result in fourth, I think we would have taken that. Andreas also demonstrated his huge potential by fighting for a podium early on before his unfortunate retirement, but I am sure that he and Anders will turn things round in Sweden.

It was our most competitive Monte performance so far and I am pleased that we could play such an influential role in the rally. All our crews demonstrated strong, competitive pace and were capable of finishing on the podium. I hope this is a sign of things to come for the entire season.

And so, we move on to Rally Sweden – an event we won last year with Thierry and where we know our Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC will be extremely competitive. It should be noted that Thierry and Sébastien are among the few non-Nordic winners of this event.

Our Scandinavian star Andreas has also come close to prevailing on what is in part home soil, with some of the stages contested in Norway.

We look forward to defending our success on these snowy stages with the Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC and another strong showing from the whole Hyundai Motorsport team.

ON STAGE WITH... ANDREAS MIKKELSEN

Your previous best result in Sweden was second in 2014 – what do you need to do to win this year?

"First of all, you need to get the feeling right with the car. Also, our lower starting position on the road should be a good help so we will just hope for fresh snow to take advantage of that. But you need to be flat out from the first stage to the very end because the pace is always high."

What would it mean to you to win in Sweden, particularly as some of the stages are run on home soil in Norway?

"It's the closest I come to a home rally with

one day in Norway. We have a lot of Norwegians watching and it's always great to see them coming out to cheer you on. But I don't feel any more pressure because of that."

How are you finding having Sébastien Loeb, a nine-time world champion, in your team?

"It's really great. He is making a big contribution, he has a lot of experience from all the rounds and he knows what it takes to be a champion. It worked well on Rallye Monte-Carlo, we are all quite similar when it comes to feedback, so that proves we are working in the right direction."

What are the particular challenges on Rally Sweden?

"The challenge is to understand the grip and how hard you can push. You can use the snowbanks but not too much. If it's a soft bank you can get pulled in. You can use them a bit to support you, but you have to watch out for punctures and hitting the snowbanks too much."

How do you best prepare for a specialist, high-speed rally such as Sweden?

"It's the only rally on snow and ice so we go through onboard videos a lot. We had a test in Sweden in an area where the roads were pretty similar to the rally so hopefully we can be ready to attack the stages."

HYUNDAI HAPPENINGS

- Hyundai Motorsport began the 2019 World Rally Championship season with a thrilling fight for victory on Rallye Monte-Carlo where Thierry Neuville finished just behind Citroën's Sébastien Ogier. The closestever Monte went down to the wire with Neuville extracting maximum performance from his Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC alongside co-driver Nicolas Gilsoul to end up just 2.2 seconds behind his rival after more than 300km of typically testing stages.
- A fighting fourth-place finish for Sébastien Loeb and Daniel Elena in their first rally with the team underscored a positive opening weekend for Hyundai Motorsport, which took an early lead in the Manufacturers' championship with 30 points. Despite just one day of testing prior to the rally, the French crew claimed two stage wins and were firmly in the podium hunt.
- Andreas Mikkelsen and Anders Jæger-Amland also impressed during the weekend, pushing hard for a podium on Saturday morning prior to their untimely retirement. It was an encouraging performance for the Norwegians with plenty of positives to take on to Rally Sweden.
- Hyundai Motorsport tested for Rally Sweden at the start of February, with Neuville, Mikkelsen and Loeb each completing one day of running.
- Hyundai Motorsport crew Dani Sordo and Carlos del Barrio will join the field on next month's Rali Serras de Fafe at the wheel of a Hyundai i20 R5. The duo will contest the gravel rally, round one of the Portuguese national championship, as part of their preparations for Rally México. The competition – just two weeks before the Léon-based event – will give the Spanish pairing an opportunity to focus on performance ahead of their 2019 WRC debut.
- Stéphane Sarrazin and Jacques-Julien Renucci gave the i20 R5 a first topten finish in the WRC on Rallye Monte-Carlo. Driving a car prepared by Sarrazin's team the pair were among the quickest R5 crews throughout the event, held on typically varied road conditions. They took three consecutive second-fastest R5 times to claim ninth overall and third in class.
- German Luca Engstler made a victorious start to his 2019 season in the TCR Malaysia series. Taking his Liqui Moly Team Engstler Hyundai i30 N TCR to Asia for the first time after debuting it in TCR Germany last year, Engstler won both races at the Sepang Circuit on January 19-20, and scored another double the following weekend. The results not only left Engstler within reach of the title, but also put the i30 N TCR atop the Car Model of the Year points with two races remaining.

HYUNDAI IN NUMBERS

11: With crews allowed to select their own permanent car numbers for 2019, Thierry Neuville has opted for 11 as a reminder of the first time he and Nicolas Gilsoul finished as championship runners-up in 2013: "It means a lot to us because it was our first strong season in WRC," he explains. "Both Nicolas and I wanted the number 11, which also has the number one in it. We hope it will bring us success."

89: Andreas Mikkelsen and Anders Jæger-Amland's car number is partly based on their successful driving partnership. "It was a natural choice for us," says the Norwegian. "It represents the year we were both born: 1989. We are good friends, we work together very well and this number seemed the perfect fit."

19: Sébastien Loeb and Daniel Elena's car number was an obvious choice, given that this season marks the 20thanniversary of their WRC debut. But as he explains there were other reasons for the decision: "The number 19 is the birth date of my daughter, Valentine. It's also representative of the one JWRC title and nine WRC titles that I have acquired over the years, which is nice."

6: Dani Sordo, meanwhile, is sticking with a car number that has served him well." chose the number six because it's what I've been using in recent seasons with Hyundai and it has brought us some good results," says the Spaniard, who is co-driven by Carlos del Barrio. "We have nice memories using this number, so maybe it will bring us even better results this season!"

30: Neuville's second place on Rallye Monte-Carlo along with Loeb's fourthplace finish means Hyundai Motorsport has taken an early lead in the Manufacturers' championship with 30 points.

44: Second place for Thierry and Gilsoul in Monte was also Hyundai's 44th podium result in the WRC.

5.2: Hyundai Motorsport has fans all around the world who follow its efforts in the WRC and Customer Racing through social media, with over 5.2 million likes on Facebook. The team also has 68,900 followers on Twitter and more than 179,000 on Instagram.

THIERRY NEUVILLE Date of birth: June 16, 1988 Place of birth: Sankt Vith, Belgium Nationality: Belgian WRC starts: 98 WRC wins: 9 No driver has driven for or won more with Hyundai Motorsport than Neuville, an ever-present for the team since 2014, when he scored the first of nine (and counting) WRC wins. Four came in 2017, but while no driver bettered his total that season, he would have to settle for second to Sébastien Ogier, something he did in 2016 and 2018 when he lost out on Rally Australia's final-round decider. Having enjoyed huge success at junior level before stepping up to the WRC in 2009, the Belgian finished second in 2013. That achievement caught the eye of Hyundai's fledgling WRC team and he was signed for its debut season in 2014. He scored the team's first podium in Mexico that year and led a memorable one-two (ahead of Dani Sordo) on Rallve Deutschland - the squad's maiden victory. Neuville got his 2019 season off to a strong start with second place on Rallye Monte-Carlo.

NICOLAS GILSOUL Date of birth: February 5, 1982 Place of birth: Chénée, Belgium Nationality: Belgian WRC starts: 94 WRC wins: 9 Gilsoul's WRC adventure began in 2007, two seasons before Neuville's step up to world level, while the Belgians did not join forces until 2011. The partnership quickly blossomed, however, with victory on the Tour de Corse, then a round of the IRC, in only their second event together. Their move to Hyundai Motorsport for 2014 has so far produced nine wins while Gilsoul was awarded the prestigious WRC Co-driver of the Year accolade in 2016 after finishing second in the championship. As well as myriad stage rallies in Europe and beyond, Gilsoul has tackled the East African Safari Classic Rally on three occasions, finishing a best of third in 2015 alongside Grégoire de Mevius.

ANDREAS MIKKELSEN Date of birth: June 22, 1989 Place of birth: Oslo, Norway Nationality: Norwegian WRC starts: 101 WRC wins: 3 Having joined Hyundai Motorsport for three lateseason events in 2017, Mikkelsen is embarking on his second full campaign with the squad this year when better luck will be the order of the day following a frustrating 2018, which the Norwegian completed with a solitary podium to show for his efforts. A successful skier at youth level, Mikkelsen switched to rallying when injury curtailed his promising career on the slopes. Relocating to the UK for 2006, he was a winner shortly after getting his driving licence following his 17th birthday. After becoming the youngest WRC point-scorer in 2008, Mikkelsen won backto-back Intercontinental Rally Challenge titles in 2011-12. He took his maiden WRC victory with Volkswagen in 2015 and triumphed again in Poland and Australia the following season.

ANDERS JÆGER-AMLAND Date of birth: July 29, 1989 Place of birth: Oslo, Norway Nationality: Norwegian WRC starts: 45 WRC wins: 2 Jæger-Amland has enjoyed a rapid rise to rallying's top level having started his career in 2014 in his native Norway alongside Bernt Kollevold. He made his world championship debut that year with Ole Christian Veiby in Spain before going on to contest a mix of mainly Junior WRC and European championship events the following season, scoring five podiums including a win in the former. Jæger-Amland's partnership with long-time friend Mikkelsen began in fine style in 2016 when they were second on Rallye Monte-Carlo, one of six podium visits that year which included two victories.

Twenty years after he burst onto the world stage in Spain, rallying's most successful driver returns to the sport's top flight for a six-event campaign with Hyundai Motorsport, only the third car make he's represented in the WRC. Loeb took two stage wins on his way to a fighting fourth place on the first round of 2019 in Monte-Carlo, adding to the 911 stage victories scored during his career so far as well as 79 wins and 117 podiums. He's demonstrated impressive versatility over the years too, winning in the World Touring Car and World Rallycross championships. He was competitive in two appearances in the Le Mans 24 Hours - finishing second in 2006 - in Formula One tests with Renault and Red Bull, and brought his considerable ability to the Dakar Rally and Pikes Peak Hillclimb, where he broke the course record in 2013 by 1m30s. Loeb has transferred his talents to team management, with the eponymous team he co-owns winning in several disciplines.

Loeb's wingman since 1997, four years after he first began competing. Elena has also tried driving for size. Indeed, he began 1997 behind the wheel on Rallye Monte-Carlo but crashed out. He had another go 12 months later and finished second in class, but his partnership with Loeb was already in full swing by then and driving was put firmly on the backburner. The Loeb/Elena alliance soon flourished and would be the stuff of legend by the time Loeb stopped rallying full-time at the end of 2012. While Loeb then raced in the WTCC and WRX, Elena has remained 'rally fit' by competing sporadically both driving and navigating.

Thierry Neuville has won nine times for Hyundai Motorsport in the FIA World Rally Championship. But it was his victory alongside codriver Nicolas Gilsoul in Sardinia in 2018 that really stands out, after he overcame a 3.9s deficit to beat Sébastien Ogier to victory by 0.7s in a thrilling final stage.

What has been your best moment with Hyundai Motorsport?

"My win in Sardinia last year after a close battle with Sébastien Ogier. It was really tight – there was 0.7 seconds between us at the finish – so there was a lot of excitement. We knew we had to give it everything and it was a truly fantastic fight."

How did you do it?

"We kept pushing as hard as we could without doing anything stupid. It was the perfect Sunday morning with four stage wins but battling against Seb is one of the most difficult things to do. Starting first on the road on Friday put us at a disadvantage. The rain helped a bit but we never gave up. After 313 kilometres of stages we won by 0.7 seconds, which was amazing, one of the finest wins of our career. But we had to thank Hyundai Motorsport for giving us such a great car."

Why was the win so special?

"It was a really important moment in the fight for the title as we headed into the second half of the season in the lead of the championship with a lot of momentum. The win felt great of course, especially when everybody from the team jumped into the sea afterwards to celebrate! We beat Elfyn Evans by the same amount in Argentina the year before so it's obviously a gap we like to win by!"

So what got you interested in driving in the first place?

"I always dreamed about being a rally driver and when I was young I followed Bruno Thiry. He was a driver from my area in Belgium who gave me a lot of inspiration. I went with my father to several events and I always enjoyed watching him, he was very spectacular."

SWEDEN MEANS

- A founding round of the World Championship in 1973, Rally Sweden has been run since 1950 when it was a summer-time event known as the Rally to the Midnight Sun.
- Long since moved to a winter slot, it is now the only WRC round held in
 pure snow conditions, with drivers having to master the art of leaning their
 studded tyre-shod cars on the snowbanks lining the stages as they seek
 out grip and traction. Not enough snow can result in studs being ripped
 from the tyres, leading to inadequate grip levels, and a lack of wintry
 conditions has previously forced organisers to cancel the event.
- Hyundai Motorsport's Thierry Neuville and Sébastien Loeb are among the few non-Nordic drivers to have won in Sweden, in 2018 and 2004 respectively. Nine-time champion Loeb has claimed a further four second places on this high-speed event, which is also Andreas Mikkelsen's best result so far, set in 2014.
- While rallying legend Stig Blomqvist has racked up the most Swedish victories with seven, Finland's double champion Marcus Grönholm – returning to WRC action for the first time in nine years in Sweden with Toyota – is not that far behind on five.
- Once again, the action kicks off with the Karlstad superspecial at the Färjestad Trotting Course on Thursday evening, followed by stages run largely on neighbouring Norwegian soil on Friday. There are two loops based around the Hof-Finnskog, Svullrya and Röjden tests, followed by an initial run through the 8.93km Torsby sprint stage back in Sweden at the end of the day.
- Classic Swedish tests follow on Saturday and Sunday. Crews pass through Rämmen, Hagfors and Vargåsen on Saturday before another blast through the superspecials at Karlstad and Torsby. There are then two visits to the Likenäs stage on Sunday before a final run through Torsby, which also counts as the live-for-TV Power Stage.






